## P07 - RE-THINKING IBERIAN BOUNDARIES IN THE RIO DE LA PLATA – AGENCIES, CIRCULATIONS, AND INTERACTIONS IN THE TUPI-GUARANI AREA (16TH-19TH CENTURIES)

## **ABSTRACT**

During the Early Modern period, the Iberian frontiers in America were undefined and disputed. Diplomatic meetings between Spain and Portugal that sought compliance of the Treaty of Tordesillas in Latin America multiplied all throughout the colonial period. The panel *Re-thinking Iberian Boundaries in the Rio de la Plata – Agencies, Circulations, and Interactions in the Tupi-Guarani area* (16th-19th centuries), proposes to study the conflicts and negotiations concerning the definition of the American frontiers between Spain and Portugal in the Rio de la Plata region. This is a key region for understanding transatlantic contacts between the two Crowns in the Americas and, to date, this has not been sufficiently studied. As such, boundary realities will be studied beyond the juridical aspect in order to examine the facts and practices on the ground. Consideration of Indigenous peoples' migrations, Europeans' movements, and goods exchanges will be central to the analysis of the configuration of the Platine frontiers. Also, the panel will particularly welcome contributions on linguistics frontiers in the Tupi-Guarani area from the earliest colonial period to the independences. Based on an analysis of Tupi, Guarani, French, Portuguese and Spanish documents, this panel aims at contributing to a better understanding of subaltern strategies in the Southern frontiers of the Atlantic.

**Guillaume Candela** is currently an Instructor at Aberystwyth University and has been between 2019-2020 a CLIR Postdoctoral Fellow for Data Curation at the John Carter Brown Library at Brown University where he has developed the digital project Caribbean and Latin American Indigenous Languages at the JCB. He defended his Ph.D. at the Sorbonne-Nouvelle Paris III University. His dissertation focuses on the "spiritual conquest" of Paraguay examining the interactions between religious and natives. His professional experience includes also a counseling post as Counsellor of the Minister of Culture in Paraguay and a teaching post as Assistant Professor of Spanish at François-Rabelais University (Tours, France). In 2018, he published a book in Paraguay Entre la pluma y la cruz. El clérigo Martín González y la desconocida historia de su defensa de los indios del Paraguay. Documentos inéditos (1543-1575).
